That was the starting point of my spiritual life journey with the LORD. I became a devoted, true believer when I was around 20.

I am still single, not married yet, and have no kids. My father and mother live in Burma/Myanmar, and my only younger sister lives in Japan.

About My Ministry

I am an SBC-endorsed full-time staff chaplain at Harris Health System in Houston, Texas. I am assigned to both pavilions: Ben Taub Level I Trauma Center Hospital and Lyndon B. Johnson Level III Trauma Center Hospital.

After I experienced the love of God through my life circumstances, I wanted to grow spiritually. Since then, I have participated in church and ministry by serving based on what the church and ministry needed. I got my calling for full-time ministry through the mentor relationship with my pastor there.
