### **About My Church Plant**

Imagine how you might feel if I told you that less than 1% of the people in a capital city attended a worship service (of any religion) on any given weekend. This might come as a surprise, but this is our reality. Although some form of Christianity has been on the shores of Canada's most easterly province—Newfoundland—for the better part of 500 years, many people still either don't know Jesus or have a vague understanding of Him.

With a population of just over 9,000, unemployment nearing 13% and a community steeped in culture, traditionalism, superstition and rituals, Kilbride Community Church (KCC) exists to bring hope to a community that's shrouded in darkness. This is an area of great social need, but the greatest need is, in fact, spiritual. There hasn't been a church in Kilbride since 1892.
